nother iceboat season has come to an end. This was certainly a hard one. I would like to thank all of you for your patience during the Worlds and North Americans as we scrambled for a location. I would also like to publicly thank Western Region Commodore Mike Miller, co-PROs Joe Norton and Dan Heaney, and all the wonderful volunteers that helped us pull it off. With one season ending, the planning for the next one begins.

In the off season, the Governing Committee (GC) has been working with Bob Cummins and Mike Bloom along with our European counterparts to begin to bring the two organizations closer and revamp the Specifications Management agreement. This has been progressing slowly, and frankly Europe has not been able to formulate what they want yet so I would not expect any sort of agreement this year.

Eastern Lakes Rear Commodore Chad Atkins with help from Canadian Rear Commodore, John Curtis, is organizing the 2018 North American Championship. Dates have been selected and approved by the GC, the race committee is selected, and on board.

The GC will hold a vote on the specification change for allowing para aramid fibers in the construction of tillers, expect that vote to come out in September, with the results announced in December.

At the annual meeting, the membership was strongly in favor of trying electronic balloting for North American votes. The GC will also begin to work on a proposal to allow electronic voting with the intention of presenting it to the membership this coming year.

Lastly Daniel Hearn has replaced Mike Miller as Western Rear Commodore. I would like to thank Mike for all his hard work the last 3 years and look forward to working with Daniel going forward.

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

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HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 2017 IDNIYRA EU NATIONAL SECRETARIES MEETING

he National Secretaries Meeting of IDNIYRA Europe was held in Warsaw the weekend of 22/23 April, 2017. Warren Nethercote, the IDNIYRA Vice Commodore, was the North American representative to the meeting.

The meeting set dates for key regattas in 2018, starting with the Gold Cup. Estonia will be the host nation for the 2018 World Cup and European Championships, February 25th to March 3rd, 2018. If the weather and ice conditions allow the regatta to be sailed in Estonia it will be an opportunity to celebrate the centenary of iceboating in that country. Other regatta dates spun off the dates for the Gold Cup: February 5th to 9th, 2018 for the Junior DN and Ice Opti Worlds and January 21st to 27th, 2018 for the North American Championships.



The meeting approved adoption of PayPal for regatta registration payments to IDNIYRA Europe, to replace the current requirement for bank wire transfers. This change was seen as a benefit to



both competitors and to the ID-NIYRA Europe. Making PayPal a serial step in the registration process would make the registration process simpler for competitors, and simplify the registration validation process for IDNIYRA Europe. Implementation for the 2018 regatta season was set as a desirable target.

The editorial costs of IDNIYRA Year Book have to date been borne by North America: the ready-to-print file has been prepared by the North American Executive Secretary, and posted to the IDNIYRA North American website. Individuals wanting printed copies have then ordered them using an ondemand printing contractor. The North American Governing Committee requested that IDNIYRA Europe share the editorial costs with North America. The National Secretaries agreed to this request and in future will be able to host an on-line version of the ID-NIYRA Year Book on the IDNIYRA Europe web site.

The Technical Committee's report to the meeting recommended that IDNIYRA support the production of numbered sets of NC manufactured measurement jigs for runners. Jeff Kent had produced a prototype set that had been tested during the 2017 season. The meeting accepted the recommendation and agreed to support production. This would both simplify and make measurement of runners more reliable.

During the report on the IDNIYRA Europe event insurance program the Insurance Manager noted that the insurers had recently paid more in claims than they had received in premiums. Finding underwriters willing to provide this insurance product was never easy, and lack of profitability would not encourage them to participate in the market. It is possible that some future policy might be limited to third-party personal liability, leaving liability for third-party property as a matter for the competitors. It might ultimately see property damage in DN racing being treated similarly to that in motor

sports, where participants assume their own risk.

The North American and European Governing Committees have been investigating ways to strengthen the DN class, which is unusual in having distributed governance. Various options have been floated, up to a new, 'world-wide organization' to oversee the class. The two Governing Committees agree that a single world-wide organization is a bridge too far, and that the focus should be on strengthening areas of commonality: technical specifications, specifications management, and regatta management. The meeting largely focused on that and identified preferred European candidates for a working party related to areas of commonality.

With respect to technical specifications, a pilot demonstration of consolidation of the interpretations within the class rules was proposed, using one section of the specifications as an example. Section C, Mast, is the most likely candidate for the pilot, although Section A, Fuselage, might better illustrate the benefits of consolidation. If both Governing Committees liked the result the Technical Committee could take on a fuller revision for ultimate presentation to the membership for approval.

The National Secretaries and the European Governing Committee were satisfied with the NIA rules, but

expressed frustration with lack of European representation on the NIA Board. A separate DN-based rules organization was suggested as an alternative, but was not supported as long as there was a possibility of NIA Board representation.

There was discussion of introduction of electronic voting in support of governance of technical specifications, specifications management, and regatta management. This introduced issues of membership, with national Secretaries noting that the membership lists supplied for the Year Book were not necessarily, or even generally, lists of 'paid' members as defined by IDNIYRA Europe, so that the member database for voting purposes would need to be separate from that supplied for purposes of Year Book publication. There was initial discussion as procedures so that National Secretaries could validate and populate a list of paid members in an electronic voting database. It was acknowledged that the management of a common, world-wide voting data base might prove to be a contentious issue.

This is not a complete record of discussion, but focuses on topics that I consider of most interest to North American members. Any inaccuracies are mine alone.




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2017 DN WORLDS & NORTH AMERICANS

unning a major regatta such as the Gold Cup and North Americans for the first time was a challenge and required lots of work by a dedicated team of volunteers.

I selected the third week of January which is typically the coldest week of the year in the Western Region. Of course, Mother Nature turned the week into record warmth and rain!

Finding a site turned out to be the toughest part of the job as Regatta Chair, with ice scouters across North America venturing onto all sorts of ice and snow in the weeks preceding the event. My travel companion Tom Meyer and I even ventured on to Lake Superior near Bayfield Wisconsin in the days preceding the event. Finding a solid sheet of hard, new ice was very elusive, so we got creative. Eric Anderson and Eben Whitcomb even drove all night after ice scouting Eastern Ontario to see what we had found at Bayfield. In the end, the warmth and rain created dangerous drain holes on Superior.

Fortunately, the Madison ice scouters determined Lake Kegonsa would be ok, so after a day delay, 108 racers including 19 Europeans found the site. Big thanks to Jim Nordhaus for erecting a ramp and Springer's Bar for allowing use of their parking lot and pits. The key Race Committee team of Joe Norton, Dan Heaney, Loretta Rehe and Deb Whitehorse did a splendid job of running and scoring efficient races.

After only 3 races in each of the 3 fleets on Monday, we waited all day Tuesday for the breeze to fill. No luck! The light snow started late in the day and ended up to be about 5 inches of wet stuff by morning. The Gold Cup was called complete. Karol (the King) Jablonski won his 11th Gold Cup with a string of 3 firsts! Tim Sugar wins the Silver Fleet while Chad Coberly wins Bronze.

Wednesday was a layover day to find new ice. Scouts went in 3 directions in WI and MI. A few others ventured up to the resort area of Tomahawk, WI to wait out the decision and rent snowmobiles. No luck for the snowmobiling group, as the snow had all been rained away! A number of Gold Cup racers drove home, thinking it looked hopeless. Finally by Thursday, Mike DeRusha and his buddies found good ice on Green Bay of Lake Michigan, only a 3 hour drive to Oconto. The NA's would be a 2 day event.

- It was a drive-on landing to the main lake, a treat for the 85 racers. Good winds, colder temps and fast ice made for a 7 race series for both the Gold and Silver Fleet. Despite a weld failure on his mast hound in race 1, Ron Sherry found a way to win the Gold Fleet North American's. He put together an impressive string of only 7 points in 6 races to win his 12th NA Championship. His son, Griffin who missed qualifying in Gold by only one point, battled until the last race winning the Silver Fleet! It was a very happy awards ceremony for Ron & Griffin.
- The happy faces and compliments from many who said it was the best run Worlds and NA's in many years made all the work seem a distant memory. One word of advice to the future Regatta Chairs, start early and get a solid team of helpers! O yeah.

he Canadian DN Championships were held here in Thunder Bay in Ontario, Canada on March 25-26, 2017. This was the second major DN event held in Thunder Bay. The first was the 2011 DN North Americans when I was first introduced to this sport and purchased my boat.

It has been my goal since purchasing the boat to host another event here but circumstances beyond my control have prevented that from happening. Thunder Bay again was blessed with another great iceboating season and with the year winding down without the Canadians being held, our ice sailing community was asked to host the regatta.

When we first published are intentions to host we had great ice and a really nice launch facility. The weather looked in our favour and we had all plans in place. Unfortunately, Mother Nature dealt us a cruel blow with a forecast for a weather system to go though Thursday night on the eve of the regatta. It was a rather stressful night as I alternated between watching the storm and returning calls and e-mails to the competitors that were interested in coming.

Very early Friday morning I was in contact with our ice scout on the scene, Brian Forsyth, and the report was promising. We had only received $1.5^{\prime\prime}$ of wet snow and the warming forecast promised some melting. The regatta was a go!

I spent the morning setting up our vintage Skeeter THUNDER JET, running around picking up supplies, and talking on the phone. What a relief when I saw Brian out on his Mini Skeeter sailing swiftly though the snow covered ice.

After sailing THUNDER JET over to regatta site, Brian and I prepared the site. First to arrive was Pat Heppert from Minneapolis, MN with his amazing cab forward C Skeeter, DRIFTER. He was shortly followed by Peter Van Rossem KC2766, New York's Guy Lovejoy US4638 and Michigan's David Frost US5358.

We all began sailing and after some scenic cruising we set up a race course and numerous scrub races took place. By this time the snow had pretty much disappeared from surface and left the ice smooth.

Finally when we got all the boats in from playing.the barbecue was on and beverages were out. By this time Jori Lenon US5397 had arrived on her own from Madison, Wisconsin which was pretty impressive. Also the rest of the Thunder Bay fleet was there to enjoy the beautiful evening. For those who stayed late, we were graced by the presence of a wolf strolling out on

Even though we pulled off 9 races there was plenty of time between races to socialize and be entertained by Pat ripping off hot laps in DRIFTER. At the end of the day Pete and Guy took the opportunity to cruise the big plate of ice. Also THUNDER JET was busy giving rides and Pat allowed a few of us to drive his machine.

The awards and party was held at a classic Thunder Bay sailing bar, On Deck, where good food and camaraderie was enjoyed by all. The event was a great success and thanks go out to the following people that made it happen:

THEHEART OF SIBERIA

BAIKAL'S PROMISE OF BEAUTIFUL ICE A METER AND HALF THICK MAKES IT AN IRRESISTIBLE DRAW TO DN SAILORS FROM AROUND THE WORLD.

ake Baikal is in the heart of Siberia, half a world away from Chicago. It takes two overnight flights, a rough five-hour bus ride and the help of friends from a few countries and continents to get there. But Baikal's promise of beautiful ice a meter and a half thick makes it an irresistible draw to DN sailors. It has such a mystique that even my fiancé and occasional DN racer, Marci Grunert made the trip with me.

The first step in getting to Baikal is getting your boat there. There are two shipping containers that are packed with 44 DNs and sent from Germany to Baikal and I had to get my boat in one of them. I credit East coast DNer "T" Thieler and DN North American Champ Ron Sherry with showing me how easy world travel with a DN can be. T guided me through getting my boat to Europe – you simply check it with the airline as oversized baggage! Ron Sherry introduced me to a network of European DN sailors including Joerg Bohn, Torsten Siems, Stefan Schweneker and Dideric Van Riemsdijk who provided transportation, housing, DN storage and workspace.l cannot thank them enough.

The containers are packed immediately following the European championships. So, in February I packed up my boat, checked it as oversized baggage and met up with T and Eben Whitcomb in Frankfurt Germany. The three of us would later meet up with Joerg Bohn and drive to lake Balaton in Hungary for the Europeans, after which we returned to Germany and packed our boats into the containers for their trip to Baikal. We would all follow the boats two weeks later.

The site for the Baikal ice sailing week is vast, rugged and treeless. It is quiet. There is no town. No village. The roads are not paved and there is no traffic. Just space and stillness. They say it is the oldest lake on the planet and you can feel it.

When Marci and I arrived after two days and twelve time zones of travel we were exhausted, but buoyed by the sight of shipping containers waiting to be unloaded on the rocky shore of the lake.

The next morning I walked down the hill from our lodge, past grazing cows, to the containers on the shore. Some early risers had unloaded the boats. I found all my gear among piles of masts, hulls, sails, planks and

runner boxes. We American sailors staked claim to a patch of ice between the Polish and the Swiss sailors. It didn't take long for us to rig up and get out on the ice. The ice was thick and crystal clear.

There were 79 DNs and about 20 juniors sailing ice Optis. The first order of racing was a series of qualifier races to split the 79 into gold and silver fleets. Then, for the next seven days we raced every day but one. The breeze never settled down enough to set a course until about 1 pm, but that left the mornings for tuning, testing, talking, inspecting other boats, ice skating, yoga, hiking up the mountain to

drink from a sacred Buddhist spring or visiting the Buddhist stupa. Once the racing began it was shifty conditions. Often in DN racing tuning and speed are king, but here strategy and tactics dominated. The competition was tough. Most races saw multiple lead changes and tight racing in both fleets. Especially fast in the gold fleet were Jost Kolb from Germany, Peter Hamrak from Hungary, Marek Stefaniuk from Poland and Oleg Vasilev from Russia. Over the eight days there were four scored events. I happened to win the one for which the mayor of Irkutsk showed up, along with the media.

After eight days of sailing against some of the sport's best I had gleaned a season's worth of information about settings, tuning, technique, made a ton of new friends and was exhausted. Yet, after the final awards were handed out and all the media had left, I could not resist pushing off with my good friend Peter Hamrak for one last lap around the course in the fading light and breeze of Lake Baikal.

His research found a number of commercial options (10+) with fees ranging from \$0.10/member to free. Preserving anonymity is important.



- Eric Anderson Generally in favor?
- US-5358 "just do it".
- · Show of hands: unanimous.
- US-5214: we need to solidify the definition of membership between NA and EU. Eric Anderson: this is a concern among the NA Exec. Comm. too.
- Three NA members were asked to work with the EU representatives on "re-internationalization". Bob Cummins, Bob Schumacher, Mike Bloom

Mike Bloom and Christian Seegers (EU) are both lawyers. First order of business to defining "membership".

Second, regularization of the "racing experience" in NA and EU. Other considerations: where to charter any new organizations? All still very preliminary.

- US-3535: Other existing classes as a model? (ex. Etchells, Star, etc.) Bob Cummins: we will definitely look those.
- US-2545: One unified organization? Officers?

Bob Cummins: need continental officers in addition to the international class administration. International class organization would only have jurisdiction over the core aspects of the class.

- · Eric Anderson: Split of responsibilities one of the main issues. Currently the Specification Management is the only international process.
- Bob Cummins: "fairness" is a big issue. Currently only NA members vote on class issues (ex. Constitution and By-Laws changes).
- US-2545 & US-5214: "Good idea!"
- 1st Proposal: Bob Cummins Fleet Splitting Just clarifying what is currently done.

Discussion on the need for the change and alternatives ensued. Generally agreed that giving the Race Organizers more options is good.

Motion to call the question: US-294, 2nd US-5369 - Passes. Proposal will go to ballot in the spring.

• 2nd Proposal: Eric Anderson – change the number of runners rule

Eric said one of his broad goals as Commodore is to simplify and reduce the cost of competing. This is one item in addition to regularizing the appeals process, courses, etc.

An extensive discussion on unintended-consequences, enforcement, cost of runners vs. the cost of attending regattas, devaluing existing runners, the strength of T-runners.

US-44: "10 [runners] is enough"



G-737: Tried in Germany for 2001 and abandoned. Question Called: 14 Aye, 30 Nay – motion does not carry.

- 3rd Proposal: Eric Anderson Eliminate T-Runners US-3535: We should probably wait until we have a good EU/NA balloting system. US-3433: Agreed. Question Called: 16 Aye, 30+ Nay – motion does not carry.


