ova Scotia had its best winter in 10 years for the 2013/2014 season. As New England sailors scrambled to even find ice, we sailed in Nova Scotia from 29 December (on salt water) through to the middle of March (on Sherbrooke Lake). There was still ice to be had after that, but slush runner conditions held no draw for sailors who had sailed three or four days some weeks.

ur racing season was less successful, as we lost two of our 'catalyst' sailors to injuries. One broke an ankle by sailing into a known pressure ridge at speed and the other fell on his household steps, dislocating a shoulder. With these two out of action, there were only two road warriors left to show the club flag at away events, but Bob Crinion and Warren Nethercote enjoyed their experiences at the Great Western Challenge, the Eastern Region Championships and the Doc fellows/Maine State weekend.

he Club finally held the Maritimes Championship on the 22nd March, after it was clear that no member would travel to the Canadian Championships in Kingston. Tyler Garland won the four race series, largely through really smart sailing on the downwind legs. Tyler's victory was especially encouraging as it is young sailors like Tyler that the club needs most to ensure continued viability.

## DN CLASS FINANCES AND PARTICIPATION 1998 - 2013

How we got here and where do we go?



This years annual meeting of the DN class discussed several subjects, among which were membership numbers, regatta attendance, and the state of the treasury. The class has for some time been faced with declining membership, dwindling financial resources, and weak regatta attendance. This article presents data which illustrates participation and financial/membership data for the last sixteen years in North America. The combined data demonstrates direct relationships between certain events both within and beyond our control that have contributed to our present state of affairs. Certain conclusions resulting from an examination of the data are presented.

Among suggested reasons for the decline in both North American membership and regatta participation are the weather, years with few if any publications, lack of dues notices, and the time and expense required for regatta attendance. We do not have actual membership numbers for the last sixteen years which is the period being examined. We do however have financials for most of those years

which include dues income and End Of Year balance information. We also have regatta attendance information for most of those years including some data for regional regattas. This data is presented in graphical form and discussed below.


Chart 1 below graphs dues income(Green line) and EOY balance information(Blue line) for the period. There are two fairly easy conclusions that can be drawn from the chart. First, in some years where we don't have significant publication expense, our EOY balance trends upward. Secondly, the decline in dues income, representing membership numbers, has been fairly steady since 2003. If the dues income of 2002 is divided by the \$15 annual dues at that time, it represents a membership of about 915. The same arithmetic in 2004 using the new \$25 annual dues represents a membership of 369. The persistent downward trend that begins in that period is indisputable and unlikely to have been caused by variations in bookkeeping methods or income reporting. The precipitous drop in membership after 2002-03 correlates directly with the dues increase that was adopted at that time.



The regatta attendance numbers that are presented in Chart 2 below are focused on the North American Championship Regatta. The total number of registrants are shown and the number of North American registrants are shown as two different lines. The attendance lines diverge in odd numbered years because of the influx of European sailors for the World Cup. The sharp participation decline in 2000 can be attributed to the long postponement with the eventual site being Miltona Minn. at the very end of the season. The dip in 2005 is attributable to another long postponement with the Worlds being held in Madison, WI and the NA's ultimately being held on Elk Lake, Michigan. The long term downward trend in participation begins after 2008 and follows the American economy downward. The European economy doesn't crash as quickly or as severely in the ice boating regions of Europe, but European

participation in North America eventually succumbs to economic pressure and drops significantly. More troubling is the continued low regatta participation by North American members whether or not it is held in conjunction with the World Championship.

The third(gold) line on Chart 2 represents the percentage of participants who self reported as being over the age of 50. That number begins to rise above 50% beginning in 2010. There was no regatta in 2011. The fourth(red) line on Chart 2 is the actual number of participants who were over the age of 50. That line follows the same economy driven downward trajectory as overall participation. The upward trend in percentage of older sailors means that we are not attracting younger sailors to our events while membership numbers are increasing slightly during the same period in Chart 1.



Charts 3 and 4 show the available participation numbers for the Western and Central Regional Regattas. (Eastern Regional data is not available for a sufficient number of regattas to be in included) The number of participants over age 50 and the percentage and numbers of participants in that group are also shown for both regions. Over all participation numbers have followed the same path as NA Championship regattas with a substantial participation dip during the worst of the recessionary period. Both regattas appear to have regained their participatory momentum after 2009 with clearly upward participation trends after that year. Total participation in the Western Region has been slightly higher than Central Region participation and the percentage of sailors over age 50 has

been slightly higher in the Central Region. (Note the y axis scale on the two charts is slightly different)


The scarcity of data for the regional regattas makes further comparisons difficult but there are a few salient points. First the Western Region is having well attended two day events and in two years, 2012 and 2013, equal or surpass the number of participants in the North American Championship. The 2013 Western Regional was held near Madison, WI., and the 2012 Western Regional was held at Spicer Minn., which is close to nowhere. The North American Championships for those years were held in the Western Region, Green Bay and Lake Pepin. Western sailors appear to be unwilling to commit to the long format regatta

even if it is held in their own region. In both regional regattas attendance trends upward in these two years while the percentage of older sailors trends downward. This suggests that younger sailors are more willing to attend a two day event. This is in stark contrast to the long format NA Championship Regatta for the same years where overall participation remained low and the percentage of older sailors increased. Concurrently, 2012 membership hit the low point for the entire period, followed by a slight uptick in 2013(Chart 1).


There is membership and participation growth in sail numbers above 5000. The shock of the dues increase previously mentioned has apparently worn off and there may now be a perception among newer sailors that the current membership fee is consistent with the value received. The retention rate of newer members is unknown, but there is some evidence that it isn't good. There are huge gaps in the 5000 series numbers in the latest year-book. We need to ask ourselves if we are providing a good value for the price?

There were remarks at the annual meeting suggesting that "we are continually selling our sport without delivering the goods". It is more accurate to say that we are not presenting the goods in a form that is acceptable to younger and newer members. The trend away from participation by younger members in longer events is not a healthy prognosis for the class. Concurrently, the apparent failure to retain the members we do recruit is also a major problem. The data presented in the charts clarifies how we arrived in our present situation. In short, a poorly conceived dues increase and the recession have been the direct causal factors leading to the present situation. Furthermore the recessionary climate has caused younger sailors to apply a "time/ wealth" constraint which has continued to keep them away from the long format events. Conversely the regional two day events have recovered from the recessionary shock with more involvement by younger sailors.

## REBUTTAL: DN CLASS FINANCES AND PARTICIPATION

## A Reply to Bob Cummins

I read with interest Bob Cummins's article re the drop in the membership and the financial situation of the class, which he kindly sent me before submitting same for publication. While I appreciate the time and effort Bob spent in preparing and writing this article, I do not agree with some of its conclusions

First, I would like to correct Bob's assertion that only older sailors voted at the annual meeting for the rejection of his proposal. Many younger sailors, some with families, also voted against it.


Historically, the current one week format for the NA,s came about as a result of the failure of the previous format. Under same, the NA Championship in the off year was a three day weekend regatta which could be postponed indefinitely, the cost of which made it extremely unattractive to attend after the first attempt. After that, the number of participants dwindled significantly. This occurred many times so a different approach had to be tried, and the class voted in the one week format. This format has in general worked, and due to the unpredictable and rapidly changing weather systems brought about by global warming, we have often needed every day of the scheduled week to pull off the regatta. This was demonstrated only too clearly at this year's NA's.

Obviously, the odds of successfully completing a regatta with a fixed date are significantly better if one has a whole week instead of only three days. Under the three day format proposed by Bob, I doubt that we would have bagged the NA's this year.

Bob mentions that attendance at three day regattas, especially in the Western region and Central region, has been higher than at the NA's. I cannot dispute these numbers, but I refute the argument that this is only due to the fact they are three day events.

Rather, I would argue that the timing, weather, cost and proximity of the venue to the pool of sailors are major factors in contributing to the higher attendance levels at these regional regattas.

Due to recent weather patterns, the West and Central regions have had more sailing time, result-



ing in those sailors enjoying the benefits of sailing in their own backyard. This has been a major factor in attracting new members in those regions. Also, the Western Regional regattas tend to be scheduled at the beginning of the season, before the NA's, and have first ice, a not unimportant factor in our unpredictable, iffy sport.

Budget wise, I would suggest that a young sailor who has already depleted the money/time away from family budget by sailing in regional regattas, will be less inclined to go to the NA's wherever they are held, even if it is a three day regatta. I am far from convinced that a young Western sailor will take the chance to travel 16 hours to come and attempt to sail, in let's say Plattsburg, for the NA's for a three day regatta, which may or may not happen, when he is unwilling to travel there under the present one week format.

Concerning the dues issue, I think a distinction must be made be-

tween the overall reduction in the number class members, and the reduction in the number of racers in regattas, local or otherwise.

While I agree with Bob that the dues increase from fifteen to twenty five dollars a year, might've had an impact on the reduction of registered members, especially the inactive ones whose sole benefit was to receive a copy of Runner Tracks, I cannot believe that an increase of ten dollars a year was responsible for the reduction in the number of active racers. There has to be other reasons for the drop, such as a weak economy, rising gas costs, etc.

While we all agree that attendance at major regattas has dropped off and that we should try and remedy the situation, caution must be exercised to determine the real causes of this drop, and thus the possible remedies.

Mistakenly identifying the cause or causes and applying the wrong

remedy could have the opposite effect, and reduce further the number of participants at the NA's. Personally I don't think going back to the old format, or Bob's proposed variation thereof, is the answer.

Perhaps this issue should be discussed in the class forum first, then a multiple choice questionnaire mailed out to get a better feel of what members want and are willing to accept before making changes, if any, to the existing format.

# 2014 NORTH AMERICAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

"IF SIXTY YEARS OF DN SAILING HAS TAUGHT US ANYTHING IT'S THAT SOME OF THESE REGATTAS GO DOWN WITHOUT A FIGHT AND OTHERS CAN BE STUBBORN"

had a feeling this was going to be a big year. Something was in the air for this regatta. We knew it was going to be interesting; but then isn't that always the case with DN regattas?

Maybe we all had a weird vibe or déjà vu moment as we sailed the Centrals at Anchor Bay, Lake St. Clair earlier in the season. This was the place where some of the first DNs gathered in February of 1953 for a little racing. Following that regatta, Bill Sarns and Clifford Cartwright began drafting up the constitution that led to the first class-sanctioned DN regatta in February, 1954.

Personally I had no idea about any of that until Kent Baker US5219 wrote about it in the NA Championship race announcement. But upon reflection I thought it was pretty cool to say the least. The mind's eye pictures narrow boats with pointy tails, wood masts standing up almost straight, booms two feet off the back decks, and skippers sitting up supported by backrests a foot high as wool hats and ear muffs flapped in the breeze. I highly doubt there was a helmet anywhere in sight.

It must have been a blast! While the gear and setups are a bit different these days I'm willing to bet the conversations haven't changed much. You just know they discussed the weather, runner details, sail shape, mast specs and materials, building tricks, sailing technique, and alignment methods. What a moment in time; these people had a boat that was new and there was a lot to figure out! That had to be exciting.

That was sixty; count 'em, sixty years ago. Holy Smokes! The boats are sure different these days but some things never change. That first regatta went through a few venue changes and for the sixtieth anniversary of the DN North American Championship perhaps a road trip was inevitable!

So what happened? Read on....

For the Rhode Island group (your author, Chad "Divider" Atkins US4487 and Oliver "Righty" Moore US5469) this odyssey began on the evening of January 15 in Chad's kitchen. The weather wasn't looking too promising but we took a vote along with his daughter (who was wearing half of her dinner), his son (who was chilling out in the kitchen sink), and his wife (who is as cool as you will ever find and was not covered with food or in a sink). It was quite a scene; you had to be there.

It was decided that following the herd to Peru, IL would be the best option and off we went. About twenty hours and two trailer tires later we were in Peru, holed up in the Holiday Inn Express across the highway from the Super Wal-Mart. I imagine the Peru in the other hemisphere looks a little different. We were postponed already because of snow and cold temperatures. Dang. Even so it was good to see everyone and do a bit of socializing and catching up. As usual, speculation and debate was rampant about site options. Scouts were out and about so I helped by watching TV in my room.





Despite the best efforts of some sailors to find ice everywhere from Minnesota to lowa there wasn't much to report. Meanwhile promising reports were filtering in from Montreal so it was decided to head east. Off we went again!

The next day those same reports spoke of 4 inches of snow in the night. Brakes on. Clock ticking. Not looking good.

The good news was that some intrepid scouts (namely Bob Schumacher US4032, Don Brush US4009, Louise Racine KC3639, Rich Crucet US500 and maybe a few others) had gone ahead and found a sailable plate near Plattsburgh, NY. The call was made to head the fleet that way and make a last ditch attempt to get this regatta started!

At this point we were up to January 23rd and time was getting short. Was this regatta going to happen??

More rumors of ice. The bitter cold temperatures that were plaguing us all week may have provided a fresh plate of snow-free ice just a few miles from the other site. Some cold-resistant scouts (Chad and Oliver, André Baby KC4360, Eric Anderson US5193, Don Brush, and Eben Whitcomb US4775) spiked their coffee with glycol, put on their "'Tonka Tuxes" (Carhartt cold weather overalls) and checked it out at first light on the 24th. Much appreciated guys! It was dark and COLD when they set out. As a show of solidarity with them I turned the heat in the hotel room up to 85F and went back to sleep. Their report was good, really good, and the best news we'd had all week in fact. They saw smooth ice with a bit of cool looking hoar frost on top.

Of course launching and sailing can't be that simple and at race HQ there was some red tape to be dealt with because we didn't know if we needed insurance or permits to launch out of the public ramp. At one point Chad jokingly asked the woman who runs the restaurant at the hotel if she knew the mayor. When she responded that in fact she did, he grabbed her arm and led her into the war room while stating in his best movie secret agent voice, "Come with me, ma'am." Maybe you had to be there. Trust me, it was classic.

Turns out we were good to go anyway and once on the ice, Bob Schumacher took charge and held a safety meeting to point out a few hazards out by the starboard layline. As soon as he said the word "hazard" the ice flexed under the group and we all dropped down about three inches as we back pedaled away from each other to spread the weight. Can't make this stuff up!

Bob also parked his boat and took over as starter and general go-to-guy. In doing this he missed out on some great sailing but earned some serious karma points and the appreciation of everyone that got to race! The flags had gone missing and we all had a chuckle when he used the bullhorn for a start flag.

The Gold Qualifier was run that afternoon in a fading breeze and the 60th Annual DN North American Champs were under way! The race was won by Steve Madden US4512 of Plymouth, MA.

January 25th was going to be THE DAY. The weather forecast was for light and variable breeze but at about 10:30 the breeze shifted south and increased. And increased some more, and then increased a little more just for kicks. It was HONKING. Sails flapping, boats tipping over, hoar frost blowing in the wind making a constant "hisssssss" noise over everything. It was pretty wild. And COLD.

Full-on, heads-up sailing was the order if the day. Four races sailed in each fleet, each one in a bit more breeze, hoar frost blowing around, and fast and furious all day.

We had all the things that keep us coming back every year. Insanely high speeds, neck and neck duels, bear-aways at the top mark that squeeze the breath out of you, and expensive carbon and glass rigs bending into impossible shapes. I went around one top mark just behind Oliver Moore and Eric Anderson as a big gust hit and I HAVE NEVER SEEN RIGS BEND THAT FAR. Words fail me. I'm amazed that they didn't pop.

The next day conditions looked OK out of the hotel window but the reports said the breeze was still howling out on the lake so a team of scouts went to see how it was on the ice.

Their report was short and sweet. Bob Schumacher announced with a grin: "30 KNOTS and gusting higher; awards here in thirty minutes!" No need for any discussion or debate! And there you have it folks; the 60th DN NAs were in the books.

Ron Sherry US44 did well for a rookie and grabbed top spot in the Gold Fleet with a string of bullets and a 7th place finish due to an out of boat experience at the bottom mark. Glad to say he is OK aside from a few bruises. Jokes aside Ron is no rookie and it shows. Mark Christensen US4824 was a close second, and Steve Orlebeke US4926 took third. The Grand Masters dominated in the silver fleet as Hal Bowman US1277 took first and Bill Coberly US472 second. John Milbank US4110 was third.

If sixty years of DN sailing has taught us anything it's that some of these regattas go down without a fight and others can be stubborn. But not as stubborn as the sailors who are determined to get them done! Western Rear Commodore Julie Jankowski US4271 deserves special recognition for managing to persevere under tough circumstances and see the regatta through to its finish. Thanks so much to everyone who made this one happen; all the scouts, race committee people, scorers, and various powers-that-be are too numerous to mention. This time the list is much longer than usual; y'all know who you are! And thanks to the sailors who made the trip east and competed.

And finally, thanks to those sailors who started this whole game sixty years ago. I think they would have been impressed.



He was well known for that but even more so for his limitless generosity. Every single story people tell about him includes a mention of how Rich showed them how to rig this, helped them to fix that, and loaned or gave them



everything from toe-warmers to kick-sleds to entire boats to use to promote the sport and simply make sure people had a good day on the ice; veterans and rookies alike.

He was equally generous with his time. Rich was a tireless ice-scout and was always on the hunt, running up the miles on the camper van to find sail-able ice all over New England. In fact he was one of the first people to scout the ice at Plattsburgh, NY for the North Americans this year. If you had a good time at that regatta, raise a glass to him!

RE-ALLY?!?!" Then he'd finish the story while shaking his head and saying "Stupid sport!" with a laugh and a grin.

We heard a lot of those familiar phrases at the North American and Eastern champs this year. Hopefully we can all take some solace in the fact that he did a lot of sailing last winter and had a great time doing it. To say he will be missed is such an understatement.... Our thoughts, prayers and condolences go out to his entire family and circle of friends, and believe me that is a big group of people!

# MEETING

MINUTES OF THE 2014 REGULAR ANNUAL MEETING OF THE NORTH AMERICAN INTERNATIONAL DN ICE YACHT RACING ASSOCATION

The regular annual meeting of the International DN Ice Yacht Racing Association (IDNIYRA) was held on Friday, January 24, 2014 at 8:38 PM in the conference room of the Holiday Inn Express, Plattsburgh, New York

The Vice Commodore, Kent Baker US5219 was the chairman. Secretary Jim McDonagh US5214 was in attendance via Skype and Treasurer Geoff Sobering US5156 was in attendance via cell phone. There was no member of the Technical Committee in attendance.

Vice Commodore Kent Baker US5219 called the meeting to order at 8:38 PM and welcomed those in attendance and a quorum was defined.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT

Vice Commodore Kent Baker US5219 read the 2013 Secretary's report from Jim McDonagh US5214. A motion to approve the draft minutes of the last regular annual meeting, sent to members in Runner Tracks, was made by Oliver Moore US5469 seconded by Nick Vitale US1006. The motion passed unanimously.
